BIO

Regie Cabico is a spoken word pioneer having won the Nuyorican Poets Cafe Grand Slam and is the first openly queer poet to take prizes in three National Poetry Slams. Mr. Cabico's television credits include two seasons of HBO's Def Poetry Jam, TEDx, and NPR's Snap Judgement. His first full-length poetry collection is *A Rabbit In Search of a Rolex* (Day Eight, 2023).

He is the lead poetry slam teaching artist at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. He has designed innovative poetry workshops for The Whitney Museum, where he was a featured poet at the 2022 Whitney Biennial as part of A Gathering of the Tribes, The Smithsonian Postal Museum, and The National Portrait Gallery in Washington, DC, among others.

Literary publications include *Poetry, Academy of American Poets-poets.org, The Georgia Review, Beltway Poetry Quarterly, Pine Hills Review,* and *Mid-Atlantic Review,* where he has been a co-editor since 2020. In 2010, Cabico produced Capturing Fire: An International Queer Poetry Slam. He is the publisher of Capfire Press which publishes the works of emerging queer spoken word artists.

Cabico is a literary curator and open mic host for Busboys and Poets, Hyattsville, Maryland and has curated the Friday Night Series at The Poetry Project at St. Mark's Church. He has hosted the open mic series at Busboys and Poets since 2008.

His work appears in over 30 anthologies including Aloud: Voices from the Nuyorican Poets Cafe (Henry Holt, 1994), The Outlaw Bible of American Poetry (Thunder's Mouth Press, 1999), Spoken Word Revolution (Sourcebooks, 2005), How Lovely The Ruins: Inspirational Poems and Words for Difficult Times (Penguin/Random House 2017.) Mr. Cabico edited two anthologies: Poetry Nation: A North American Anthology of Fusion Poetry (Vehicule Press, 1998) and Flicker Spark: A Contemporary Queer Anthology of Spoken Word (Low Brow Press, 2013) for which he received a 2013 Lambda Literary Award nomination.

Cabico received a 2008 Future Aesthetics Arts Award from The Ford Foundation, three New York Foundation for the Arts Fellowships for Poetry and/or Performance, the Larry Neal Award for Poetry and several DC Commission for the Arts Poetry Fellowships. He received three New York Innovative Theater Award Nominations for his work in *Too Much Light Makes The Baby Go Blind*.

His solo plays have been developed and produced by Dixon Place, Joe's Pub, The Public Theater, Asian Arts Initiative, Magic Theater. With UniVerses, Reg E. Gaines, Willie Perdomo, and Rha Goddess, co-wrote and starred in Rhythmicity at The Actor's Theater of Louisville's Humana Theater Festival. His solo show, *Godiva Dates & One Night Stands*, received a Broadway World nomination for Best Solo Play at the 2013 Capital Fringe Festival.

He has shared the stage with Patti Smith, Allen Ginsberg and through Howard Zinn's Portraits Project at NYU, performed with Stanley Tucci, Jesse Eisenberg, and Lupe Fiasco. He has served as artist-in-residence for New York University's Asian American Studies Program and De Anza College. He is a founding board member and former board chair of Split This Rock. The Kenyon Review named Regie Cabico the "Lady Gaga of Poetry" and he was listed in BUST magazine's 100 Men We Love.

I. **SUMMARY** A performing artist who has emerged and redefined the genre of poetry thru spoken word, experimental theater, storytelling & hip hop aesthetics since becoming the first Asian American slam poet to receive top honors in the 1993, 1994 & National Poetry Slams & the first Asian American and openly Queer Nuyorican Poets Café Grand Slam Champion. An activist and educator for the Asian American & Queer Community. Performing Arts Curator for several literary & theatrical organizations. Mr. Cabico has brought this new art form to at-risk youth, people of color, academia & internationally. One of the few slam poets who can teach both written and performing skills. An editor of several literary journals and anthologies, bringing high avant-garde and political poetry together.
