Amazing Women of History

JoAnn F. Peterson

Is a professional actor and singer who has performed in films (Astrid in "A Promise to Astrid"), equity theater (Mother Abbess in "The Sound of Music") and is a West Virginia Humanities Council History Alive! Presenter. JoAnn has turned her love for acting and history into performing first person portrayals of some of history's most amazing women. Portrayals are in the Chautauqua style – monologue followed by Q&A of the historical figure and then as the researcher. Programs are available for churches, tour groups, schools, libraries, historical societies, seniors, festivals, Chautauquas, Woman's Clubs and more!



Jenny Lind, the Swedish Nightingale, became a world-renowned opera singer whom Mendelssohn called "the most gifted artist of the century". She inspired Hans Christian Andersen to pen "The Ugly Duckling" and "The Snow Queen", the basis for Disney's "Frozen". Known for her philanthropy and great faith, she contributed to anti-slavery, the blind, widows, and others. Hear the <u>true story</u> about her American tour promoted by PT Barnum, and her life and adventures.

Mary Lincoln – The wife of Abraham Lincoln, Mary's story symbolizes the pain and loss of Civil War America. Born into a politically active, slave owning family, she was her husband's political advisor. In this portrayal, you will see Lincoln through the eyes of the woman who loved him during the tragedies that befell her divided family and the nation. Peterson performed Mary Lincoln at Cooper Union in New York City.

The compassion and courage of Margaret Tobin Brown, the "Unsinkable Molly Brown", captured the world's attention during the Titanic tragedy. Margaret ran for Senate before women had the right to vote, helped form the U.S. juvenile justice court, volunteered during WWI, and became an award-winning actress. You'll learn that her extraordinary life was even greater than the Hollywood hype.

Nellie Bly (Elizabeth Jane Cochrane) —A groundbreaking, "stunt" journalist, she feigned insanity to be committed to a "lunatic asylum" to report on the horrific conditions there. In 1890, she became the fastest human being to circle the globe, reporting along the way, completing the trip in 72 days. She was the first journalist reporting from the Eastern Front in WWI and was one of the first females to run a major business. She has performed Nellie Bly her hometown, Apollo, PA and for the U.S. Embassy in Prague.

Shirley Temple Black – From Child Star to Diplomat - humorous and poignant stories of how the darling of the Silver Screen and world's #1 box office draw (1935-38), grew up to become the Amb. to Ghana, first female Chief of Protocol, and Amb. to Czechoslovakia during the fall of Communism. "I was a child actor, a diplomat in training," said Shirley Temple Black. Peterson owns Black's SAG's Life Achievement Award ensemble and has performed Amb. Black in Prague at the US Embassy.

Abigail Adams –A witness to and active participant in our nation's birth, Abigail Adams is well known for her advocacy of women's rights, especially in education, and her opposition to slavery. A valued confident and advisor to her husband John

Adams, the nation's 2nd president, Abigail asked him to "remember the ladies" in the new laws the Founding Fathers would write for our young country.

NEW - Frances Perkins – First Female Cabinet Member, FDR's Secretary of Labor, and the woman behind the New Deal, Perkins was a social reformer and suffragist, You can thank Frances for Social Security, minimum wage, unemployment insurance, Worker's Comp, child labor laws and so much more.

A Mother's Heart Divided: a WV Civil War Story - Maisie Twigg's life is shattered when her son Willie joins the Rebels while her husband Johnny is fighting with the Union army. As Willie marches away, she wonders, "How can I now call them traitors, when my own son is one of them?" Nineteen songs of the Civil War weave the story together. This moving story will tug at your heartstrings as one mother's heart is divided in two by the Civil War, while telling the story of how West Virginia was born. As Maisie says, "In the past two years, I've lived in three states – Virginia, the Restored Government of Virginia, and West Virginia...without even moving one inch!"
